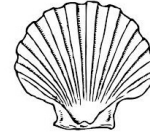

RECTOR'S NOTES

FINANCE

David Nairn, our Honorary Treasurer, and David Cromie, a member of our Select Vestry who is also the Diocesan Accountant, have been pouring over our accounts in great detail in order to present a financial report to the Select Vestry. As soon as we are able, a simplified version of their findings will be communicated to parishioners. Our parish might *appear* to be doing well: we have a beautiful church, a welcoming congregation, and organisations aimed at people of various ages. The problem is that our expenditure is not matched by our regular income, meaning that as each month goes by, we come closer and closer to the day on which our money will simply run out. That day is very much closer than you might expect! However, with a bit of strategic planning, with increased generosity of existing parishioners, and by bringing new members into the church, we *will* be able to turn this situation around. It is not my intention to say anything more on this matter at this stage, as our Honorary Treasurer and the Select Vestry need to examine the issue in greater detail and formulate a plan of action. However, I would ask you to pray that God would give the Select Vestry wisdom and discernment so that we will be able to understand and implement his vision for this parish.

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

If you regularly use the Halls then you will have noticed that the foyer and the Minor Hall have all been recently painted. In order to keep the walls in good condition, the Select Vestry has agreed to put up noticeboards. Some of these will be used for parish information, but there will be some space assigned for general or public notices. In any case, if you would like to put up a poster then please speak to myself, or my Secretary Anne Cromie, or one of the Glebe Wardens.

A small team of volunteers is currently painting the Clergy Vestry. This task was last done some twenty years ago so I very much appreciate it! In the last few months this room has been used as a meeting space for small groups of not more than six people. It is also the room in which I (or any visiting members of the clergy, including the Bishop) prepare for

services in St Peter's. It is only fitting then that this room be kept clean, tidy and well maintained in order to make sure that all who enter it see St Peter's in excellent condition. Those of you who have been in the Vestry over the years will know that there are many photos on the walls, primarily of clergy who have had some connection with St Peter's. It is my intention to continue to hang photos of any Rectors and Curates from the last 113 years. There is also a plan underway to scan and reproduce these photos in a common size so that these duplicates can be hung along the corridor connecting the Halls and the Church. I offer my sincere thanks to all who are involved in any way in all of this work.

During the past month, two dead trees in the church grounds were felled by Mr Michael Reid. Our thanks go to him for carrying out this necessary and arduous task and also to Noel Beattie, Brian Callaghan, Peter Coiley and Philip Williamson who assisted.

DIOCESAN SYNOD

Our parish is just one of many which makes up the Diocese of Connor, which covers approximately the same geographical area as County Antrim. Each year, every parish in the diocese sends both clergy and lay representatives to a meeting chaired by the Bishop, at which the business of the diocese is discussed. This meeting is called the Diocesan Synod, and this year it met on Thursday 3rd October in the Parish Halls at St Patrick's, Ballymoney. The guest speaker this year was the Rev'd Canon Phil Potter, who is the Director of Pioneering Ministry in Liverpool Diocese. Canon Potter spoke to the assembled representatives of the need for our congregations to get out of the church buildings and into the local community. He talked about various "fresh expressions of church", which challenge us to reconsider what the purpose of the church is, and how best we can fulfil that purpose. Over the coming years we will be developing our own parish vision strategy. There will be much more said about this in future issues of Parish Notes.
